Dear Parent/Carer

In May 2024, a team of inspectors from Education Scotland and the Care Inspectorate visited Midstocket Playgroup. During our visit, we talked to parents/carers and children and worked closely with the manager and practitioners.

The inspection team found the following strengths in the setting's work.

- Children who are curious and resilient problem-solvers, who enjoy their interesting experiences at nursery and in their local area very much.
- Highly positive, supportive, and nurturing relationships between parents, practitioners and children. The hardworking team share their passion for outdoor learning with children and families. There is a strong sense of community and belonging.

The following areas for improvement were identified and discussed with the manager and a representative from Aberdeen City Council.

- As planned, develop further approaches for planning, observing and monitoring the progress children make in their learning. Observations should clearly identify children's skills, and fully inform the planning of all spaces, experiences and interactions. Practitioners should ensure all learning experiences and spaces build effectively on what children already know and can do.
- Continue to improve approaches to self-evaluation. The manager should now engage practitioners, parents and children to evaluate and develop further their work.





We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate the setting's work using four quality indicators from How good is our early learning and childcare?. Quality indicators help early learning and childcare settings, local authorities and inspectors to judge what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each setting, the Scottish Government gathers details of our evaluations to keep track of how well Scottish early learning and childcare settings are doing.

We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate the early learning and childcare setting using the quality indicators from A quality framework for daycare of children, childminding and school-aged childcare. The framework supports settings, providers and inspectors to assess what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each setting, the Scottish Government gathers details of our evaluations to keep track of how well early learning and childcare settings are doing. The Care Inspectorate evaluations are also used by local authorities when considering how settings are meeting the national standard for funded early learning and childcare.

As a result of the inspection, the following areas for improvement have been made.





Area for improvement 1

To support children's play and learning, the manager and staff should ensure the environment is well resourced and inviting for children.

This is to ensure that care and support is consistent with the Health and Social Care Standards (HSCS) which state that: 'I am able to access a range of good quality equipment and furnishings to meet my needs, wishes and choices' (HSCS 5.23).

Area for improvement 2

To support children's safety, the provider should ensure a full review is carried out of the setting, identifying where all potential risks and hazards may exist for children, and take appropriate action to address these.

This is to ensure that care and support is consistent with the Health and Social Care Standards (HSCS) which state that: 'My environment is safe and secure' (HSCS 5.19).
